NOTE TO REMIND

FIRST FALKLANDS CONSULTATIVE LUNCH: TUESDAY 8 JULY 1980

Ray Whitney was in favour of a settlement with Argentina at any price: Alan Clark, the most die-hard on the other side. The other four adopted a much more reasonable position. All of them appreciated being consulted and certainly benefitted from having the facts of the situation explained, about which they were woefully ignorant.

I did not go so far as to suggest solutions but merely expressed the nature of the problem and the possible options. I did however invite them to ponder on the question of what the word 'sovereignty' actually means.

I think the nearest one can get to summarising their views is the following:

- They are happy to negotiate with the Argentines and see the point of realising the economic potential by removing the threat to the future of the Islands.
- They rest content with being told that nothing will be concluded which is not acceptable to the Islanders.

 They allafirmed that any solution that was acceptable to the Islanders would be acceptable to the Tory Party in Parliament.

- They attached enormous importance to our extending the airport to take long range jets, partly as a symbolic gesture of defiance against the Argentine and partly as a precaution against negotiations breaking down. It would certainly put us in a strong position in relation to public opinion to undertake this, although I do not judge it to be necessary under the present circumstances.
- 4. They wanted the process of consultation to be continued and offered to form a group of those interested, either Government or all-party to which I could come for future consultation whenever I wished. I accepted this in principle but said the time was not yet ripe.
